REAL ALE

Real Ale, in a nutshell (usually draught as opposed to bottled beer) is brewed traditionally from malted barley and hops, with out modern substitutes. It is not filtered or pasteurised and is served by hand pump, or electric pump or direct from the cask (wood or metal) and served without any Co2 gas pressure.

CAMRA was formed to combat the spread of Keg Beer, to the point where draught Real Ale was on the verge of disappearing completely. Not only has CAMRA stopped the march of Keg Beer but has actually seen a tremendous expansion of Real Ale with new Real Ale Breweries being opened.

KEG BEER is a bitter, bland drink served by Co2 gas pressure; usually manufactured with substitutes for the traditional ingredients; is pasteurised and filtered to the point where it is dead (Real Ale is live beer) and was thrust upon the public during the 50's, 60's and early 70's by the "big six" who gobbled up scores of small breweries such as Lacons, Steward and Patterson, Huntingdon Brewery and Phipps, taking away variety and choice from you the drinker.

SPOT THE FIZZ

A Keg or pressurised Beer can usually be recognised by the little plastic box on the bar, (of the D/D or Red Barrel type) or in the case of Greene King an imitation hand pump about 8 inches high signifies a pressurised Beer.
