

WHERE HAVE ALL THE WATNEYS PUBS CONE

Over recent months Watneys pubs have apparently been changing to Manns. Don't be fooled, they are still owned by the same group except that in this area the name has been changed to Manns. Beers on sale inside the pubs are just the same with the occasional addition of Stag Bitter and Manns IPA. The new Manns company has no brewery and therefore all its beers come from other Watneys breweries, in fact the two mentioned above come from Watneys in Norwich, now called the Norwich brewery.

Watneys, sorry I mean Manns, still own most of the pubs in and around Huntingdon, however as mentioned above some are now selling pub conditioned Stag and IPA sometimes served using electric pumps but mainly using air pressure pumps. However the company seem to be having problems with the air pumps and are trying conventional handpumps in the Northampton area. One handpump has appeared so far in this area at the Waterloo in Euntingdon and two have appeared in Peterborough, let's hope more are to follow. (C.P)
