REAL ALE FOR THE U.S.A.

This possibility is the hope of 29 year old Jon Kowolaski. At the present time Jon is studying the art of brewing under the watchful eye of Wally Pateman at the Paine & Co brewery at St. Neots.

Jon became interested in real British beer on an earlier visit to this country and after home-brewing for some time he decided that there was scope for a small real ale brewery in Maryland (near Washington D.C.) - but before he can carry out his dream it is necessary for him to learn all the details of the brewing processesand what better way than to learn in a small brewery as Paine's. PUMPS WITH NO BEER

There are now 4 pubs in St wests which have had handpumps installed over the last few years but which no longer use them. The Kings Head, South Street, a Paines house had a set of 2 installed when a number of Paines pubs changed to Real Ale then for no apparent reason new pressure taps appeared alongside the pumps and (continued overleaf) Real Ale was discontinued, why?

The Angel, Cambridge St, a wells pub had 2 handpumps installed and served Real Ale intermittently. According to the landlord the top pressure beer outsold the Real Ale but he has said that Bombardier will be available on handpump.

The Greenacres, Longsands Parade, formerly a Puddles house serving County straight from the barrel, had 2 handpumps installed when Whitbread took over. Wethereds bitter from Marlow has been on sale here occasionally and at the moment it has been withdrawn. The Wrestlers, New St, tried Ind Coope Burton Bitter on handbump, a strong ale which did not sell well according to the landlord, perhaps if the ordinary bitter had been tried it would have been successful.

Campaigning is definitely required if you want Real Ale to return to these pubs so why not pop along to one or all of the four above and ask for Real Ale, then perhaps it might return. (RE)

PUB NEWS

The George at Ramsey reopened as a Free house on 31st January. Situated in the High Street midway between the Lion and the Angel it was a Truman's tied house which closed 4 years ago due to lack of trade. The new owner, Mr, Farry Gallagher, is the former landlord of the Nelson in March. The George dates back to 1630 and has 2 lounge bars, the rear bar, which, at 66 feet, claims to be one of the longest in the area. The opening struck a first by introducing Youngers 70/- (from S & N) to the St. Neots branch area served by handpump. (MS/RO)

The extension is the third since 1976, when the brevery opened with a capacity expected to last until 1982. Unfortunately most of this expansion appears to be to increase production of supermarket take-home packs and also to double their kegging capacity. (SO)
