


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# ST. NEOTS 1986 BEER FESTIVAL





As you may have read in the local press the CAMRA Beer Festival is returning to ST.NEOTS. What will be our 9th Festival, is being held in the hall at THE CONEYGEARE EYNESBURY, ST. NEOTS from September 12th to 14th. It is being organised jointly and in conjunction with our friends from our other real ale group QUality Ale Drinkers. Sponsorship is currently being sought and positive re-actions have already been obtained from several sources. We will be publishing a special festival edition of OPENING TIMES in which advertising will be accepted from any interested parties- contact the editor on this for our charges.

It is hoped to have over 20 kils of real al and cider available at the festival from about 15 breweries. Being a small festival, we do not expect to have any local brews available. This is not in any way a knock at these breweries, just that we feel that a selection of beers that are not quite so readily on sale in the area will prove to be more of an attraction, and is indeed what people would expect to find. A full li of the proposed selection will appear in our festival newsletter.

#### -Battle to save St. Neots pub.



Following our article in the last newsletter, St. Neots Branch of CAMRA have taken up the fight to keep open the Charles Wells owned Nags Head in Eynesbury.

The Branch has appealed to Huntingdon County Council against the closure. We feel that having already lost three town centre public houses in the past few years, we are not over pubbed and do not need to lose yet another. Especially, as Eynesbury itself is a growing, thriving community. Als as there has been long time talk of Charles Wells themselves opening a new public house in Eaton Socon, it would seem totally illogical to close another.

If Charles Wells feel that The Nags Head is not commercially viable, then this does not mean they have to sell as de-licensed premises. Surely, it could be sold as a Free House — of which there are not that many in the immediate town centre area. Then, if what Charles Wells feel is correct then there would be no real competition to be afraid of for their other pubs.

On a historical note, the pub dates back to the fifteenth century and has been attracting drinkers for five centuries. The present building was constructed in 1927 and replaced the original inn which stood on what was once the village green. The brewers plan to sell the pub for redevelopment into flats, which are surely not a major need with all the current new housing schemes going on in the area — and will certainly do nothing for the community.

VAUX TRIP

The members of St.Neots CAMRA are known as keen brewery visitors, even so, it required the more intrepid among us, along with some of our friends from British Rail Guzzlers Society, whose enthusiasm for travel seems to know no bounds, to make the long trek up north recently to visit Vaux of Sunderland.


Although hardly a household name in East Anglia, Vaux are one of the largest regional breweries in the country, and like their neighbours in the North East, their reputation is largely founded on a bottled brown ale—in their case 'Double Maxim' Indeed their commitment to real ale is somewhat limited—as we were to find when we were offered 'keg' beer in the sample room.

They do, however, produce five cask ales, and we had been able to try one of these-Sunderland Draught Bitter in the brewery tap pub before our visit. The Brewery itself covers a large, impressive site in the centre of Sunderland. The ale brewhouse itself seemed the oldest part on our visit, though as readers of 'Whats Brewing' will know a new ale and lager brewhouse is to be installed this year.

The most impressive sight from an ale drinkers point of view was the row upon row of open fermenters-used by the brewery for ale production in preference to the conicals they use for lager.

An interesting comparison was also provided with our recent trip to Youngs when we were shown round the shire horse collection.

All in all an interesting day-Vaux's commitment to cask ale is not perhaps as great



as CAMRA would like-though they do now feature 'guest ales' in their pubs-and they are a major part of England's brewing industry, as such, their independence is only to be welcomed.
