JAMES PAINE LEAVE TOWN

James Paine have moved their base in the centre of St. Neots to the new industrial estate site at Alington Road, Eynesbury. After 150 years on its old site, the new location will give easier access for the larger number of delivery drays that are in evidence now that brewing has ceased and the company is concentrating on the beer agency wholesale business. The purpose built base obviously lacks the character and history of the former brewery, which is still awaiting approved plans for its redevelopment.

AND SO DOES SID! Not only are James Paine vacating the old brewery, so is Sales Manager Sid Johnson who is leaving the company to take up a new post with beer wholesalers, Scotgrange of Shefford. This is worthy of note because Sid (who is 60) has been with the brewery since he left school at the age of 14. He started work in the spirit room (those were the days when breweries blended their own spirits), before starting an apprenticeship as a cooper. Later he learnt the art of the brewing, and in latter years did much of the brewing himself - James Paine Final Brew is one of Sids. He finally ended up as Sales Manager. Over the years he has been a good friend to the local CAMRA Branch doing us many favours and for that we thank him and would like to take this opportunity to wish him well in his new job and for the future.



Kisby's Hut, Papworth Everard, a Tolly Cobbold house is now closed. This was on a lease from the owners - Papworth Settlement - which has now expired. The village is now without a pub and it remains to be seen whether or not this will be rectified by a new pub on another site.

There are new faces at **The Crown**, **Earith** a Manns pub, with Cyril and Shirley Massey taking over.

For those of you that tried Adnams
Broadside at our Beerex and liked it we can tell you that it is available in
Potton at The Rose and Crown.

Raymond and Rose Hubbard from the East Midlands have taken over the running of **The Pickled Skittle** in **St. Ives,** with 10 years experience in the trade to assist them. The pub still sells Tetley and Burton Ale, with another addition to the range being considered.

Recent incumbents at **The Globe**, Huntingdon Street, **St. Neots** are Brian and Melany Ward, who were previously at The Barley Mow, St. Albans.

We hear that **The Pear Tree**, **Bassingbourn** now has Wilkins cider available, and also has replaced its Adnams with Arkells BBB.

Free Houses undergoing changes are the **Coneygeare, Eynesbury**, St. Neots which has been sold to as yet un named new owners who will take over this busy pub on September 19th.

Rumours abound about the future of The **Cockney Pride** on the Longsands estate, **St.Neots** which is up for sale.It could well be that with only a short term remaining on its lease that it is unviable as a pub and will be sold for redevelopment.

CHARLES WELLS ON SPENDING SPREE

Charles Wells has paid £ 2.8m for 18 pubs from the Heron estate. Tenants in the former Manns pubs suddenly found that they were to have their third landlord in four months, the 18 being among the 210 pubs which Heron purchased from Grand Metropolitan in February of this year. These additions bring the Wells tied estate up to around 320 houses, giving them a presence in and around the Peterborough area for the first time.


Pubs in our local area which are affected are **The George at Spaldwick** and **The White Lion, Ramsey St. Mary's. The Three Horseshoes at Wistow** which was part of this original package has now been bought by its sitting tenant, who will run the pub as a Free House.

Other local Manns pubs sold to Heron and retained by them at this moment in time are:

Cross Keys - Upwood, Crown - Broughton, Mad Cat - Pidley, Royal Oak - Sawtry, Three Horseshoes - Abbots Ripton, Unicorn - Ramsey.

At the moment we understand they are continuing to sell the previously stocked Grand Metropolitan range of beers.

Also on the Charles Wells news front, we hear that they are experimenting with a new form of dispense. A new device is being fitted to give a "Northern" head to the beer when it is poured. Whether it will prove to be popular with drinkers in this area remains to be seen.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

On a recent outing I passed the boarded up "Kisby's Hut" at Papworth Everard and thought what a shame if a pub with a unique name like that were to close forever. This prompted me to look through the records for more unusual names and some quite odd ones there are too.

Little Staughton just over the Bedfordshire border had its "Kangaroo" at one time. Huntingdon its "True Blue", that closed during a Liberal Government in the reign of Edward VII.! St. Ives had its "Parrot" and also a "Spare Rib".

Godmanchester boasted one of my favourite names, "The Uncle Toms Cabin", it's a pity that's not still there.

Pidley's only pub is the "Mad Cat", still going strong, but over in that part of the world many strange names have long gone. Warboys has lost its "Pelican", "Blue Dog" and "Golden Drop". Nor does the wind whistle at the "Whistling Pig".

Ramsey no longer has a "Shovel and Spade", "Spotted Dog" or a Recruiting Sergeant" (Pictorially shown) and the splendidly named "Rose, Shamrock and Thistle" is but a memory.

In nearby Whittlesey, they allegedly had so many pubs they started to call them after letters of the alphabet and "The Letter B" public house still stands, but I think it was probably a lack of imagination on the part of the local citizens.

Cambridge has many pubs and it was once possible to see four pubs with unique names in a matter of a few hundred yards. The "Zebra", "Fort St. George in England" and "Champion of the Thames" all still stand dispensing good Greene King beers. But the "Rhadegund" was a wine bar the last time I saw it
