MINI-BUDGET PUTS ANOTHER 1p(?) ON A PINT

The recent mini-budget put at least another one pence on a pint and with petrol also going up, increased haulage costs could lead to an even bigger increase by the time your pint reaches you at the bar.

Reproduced below is a calculator showing the excise duty that YOU pay on a pint of beer based upon its alcoholic strength.

On top of this of course goes the VAT.

The Chancellor takes a third of the cost of YOUR pint!!

Join CAMRA in fighting for a reduction in the beer tax - not extra taxes, which consumers and the industry just does not need.

Further increases will see jobs go in the brewing and licensed trades breweries and pubs close.Tax on beer in the UK is the second highest in Europe (only Ireland is higher) and the large price differential is encouraging the purchase of large quantities of beer in France which is threatening our traditional pub.

Asthe system stands, the individual cannot be blamed for taking advantage, but each can or bottle of imported beer is a nail in this country's brewing coffin.

CAMRA of course has long campaigned for CUT in beer duty. The difference in excise duty between

England and France prior to the mini-budget was 20p for an ordinary beer and nearer 30p for a premium beer. As can be seen from the calculator, a third of the price of a British pint is tax.

The profits of the cross border trade are generated largely by the difference in tax levels. Drink is nearly 70% of the average pub's turnover, the overwhelming majority of this is beer. And the smaller the pub, the more important beer sales are to its future.

You pay EXCISE DUTY based on alcoholic strength and VAT based on sale price.

THE CROWN, EATON SOCON MAKES IT TEN YEARS IN THE GOODBEERGUIDE

lan and Sue Robinson at the Crown Free House, Eaton Socon have been presented with a certificate to celebrate their inclusion in the Good Beer Guide for ten consecutive years from 1986 - 1995.

Since they took over the pub 11 years ago the pub has always had a good range of beers with something different on in a changing selection, to test the taste buds with the quality always being to very high standard.

Branch Chair Kathy Hadfield presented the certificate and the recipients are shown below.

LOCAL NEWS

Local regional brewers, Greene King have introduced a regular seasonal ale to their portfolio. The first of which, Back Baron, a ruby coloured ale of gravity 1043 is currently available. The Spring ale will be Sourcerer at the same strength, followed by a Summer ale at 1034 gravity.

The Wheatsheaf, St. Neots has added the Black Baron to it's range and also is currently stocking the Winter Ale, 1064.

Other local pubs stocking Black Baron, that we know about are **The Millers Arms, Eaton Socon** and **The Blue Ball, St.Neots**.

On the Charles Wells front, they have also brought out a 'new' beer. This is the re-introduced Fargo at 5% ABV and is to be found in many of their tied houses locally.

The Waterloo, Huntingdon has started selling real ale, with a periodically changing guest beer, with Hoskins Penn's Ale available on the day of our visit.

Our gossips tell us that the **Dog & Bone** in **Huntingdon** is about to
undergo a change with part of the
old name of the Three Tuns being
included in its new name.

Despite efforts to close it we hear that the **George** at **Spaldwick** is now safe after protests from all and sundry upon hearing about a change of use application from Charles Wells, the owners.

Roger and Tina Collins have taken over at **The Cock, Gamlingay** a Greene King house. They were formerly at The Barley Mow, Eaton Ford, St. Neots.

The Racehorse, Catworth a Free House is presently closed as is **The Chequers** at **Fenstanton**, a Charles Wells house.

The Seven Wives, St.Ives now sports a handpump dispensing Theakstons IPA.

SUNDAY AFTERNOON OPENING ON THE WAY?

Sunday afternoon opening in pubs could be just one more push away as pressure mounts on the Home Office to take a fresh look at restrictive licensing laws.

A top-level CAMRA delegation fis to meet Junior Home Office minister Michael Forsyth to discuss the way forward for licensing hours.

Support is growing from other bodies for such a move with the English Tourist Board having now said that "anything that could give pubs more freedom to appeal to foreign visitors, including longer opening hours both on Sundays and during the week, should be considered. "The case had also been strengthened by deregulation of Sunday Trading last December.

The Licensing Act of 1988 giving drinkers more drinking time with all-day opening in pubs where landlords wanted to, had not led to Britain becoming a 'drink-sodden shebeen' according to the Times, who also said that a move on Sunday hours would be "as rational as it was congenial".

ODD SPOTS...

The 1995 Great British Beer Festival will take place at Olympia from 1st - 5th August.

Pubs after family trade will be allowed to apply for certificates allowing children into all parts of the pub under the Deregulation Act, which gained Royal Assent in November. Pubs with certificates will be allowed to let accompanied children under 14 in until 9pm provided they always offer food and soft drinks. The certificates are expected to be available in time for next year's tourist season.

The new Guinness keg fount is causing consternation as it incorporates a tap resembling a handpump which could fall foul of both CAMRA and trading standards officials. CAMRA policy is that pubs selling keeg beer or cider by misleading dispense such as the notorious Scrumpy Jack "handpump" will not be included in the Good Beer Guide.
