# RISE OF NITRO BEERS BEGINS TO SLOW DOWN

The speed at which nitro-keg beers are spreading through the country's pubs is beginning to slow - at least, it is according to a survey conducted by one CAMRA subbranch.

Gloucester's annual snapshot of all the pubsin the city has revealed 15 brands of of nitro-keg being served through 129 pumps, compared to 18 brands through 105 last year, a virtual standstill, given nitro-kegs growth in the last three years.

More good news came when it was reported that the decline in real ale volume had also levelled out

# CAMRA HITS BACK IN SHORT PINT FIGHT

CAMRA is going on the offensive in the continuing fight against the short-pint scandal.

Following Tory back bencher Eric Forth's single-handed assassination of the Private Member's Bill which would have introduced fair play for Britain's drinkers, CAMRA is reissuing its popular beer rip-off calculators in

a bid to draw public attention to the hidden profits unscrupulous pub landlords are making.

CAMRA issued over 20.000 of the credit-card sized calculators when they were launched three years ago, playing a vital part in raising public awarenes of the short pint issue.

Even though the Wines & Spirits (Beer & Cider) Bill has been killed off, full pints will become a legal requirement in due course. CAMRA is working with the Department of Trade on a full-pint regulation which may be introduced as secondary legislation.

## GREENE KING TAKEOVER BEARDS OF SUSSEX

#### ALE CHOICE WILL NOT SUFFER SAY GREENE KING

Our local regional brewer Greene King has completed a £12million takeover of Beards Brewery of Sussex. Beards in fact stopped brewing in 1959 and had its own label beers brewed by Harveys until 1986, since when it sold its wholesaling division to The Beer Seller in 1994, its 34 tenants and 9 managers have stocked ales from Scottish Courage, Harvey's and The Beer Seller with a house bitter supplied by Arundel Brewery.

The existing Beards pubs will go into the Greene King Pub Company, while the tenancies will be operated by Greene King Pub Partners with "an extension to the range of beers available rather than a contraction" according to a spokesman. The acquisition gives Greene King a foothold in attractive locality, with their attitude towrds Beards seeming to be a second step in a gradual change of culture at a brewery once known for its rigid maintenance of the traditional tie: top-selling tenants are already being offered a narrow choice of guest ales.

#### BUT PUB CLOSURES GATHER PACE

Although Greene King are said to turning back to community pubs as its main growth area, it still shows a disturbing trend of closing pubs and delicensing them. There is a provision in the Beer orders that bans brewers from selling pubs with delicensing covenants, but Greene king appear to have found a loop hole in this. The Office of Fair Trading has confirmed that the wording of the ban on brewers selling pubs with delicensing covenants did not cover leasehold transactions. A spokesman said the Beer Orders banned the transfer of interest with a restrictive ovenant - not the creation of a new interest. The fear is unless an amendment is made to the orders, other brewers will use the loophole to close surplus pubs rather than sell them as going concerns.

Greene King have continued their pub closures in St. Neots with the **Woolpack, Eynesbury** now closed following the Wheatsheaf and Blue Ball in the town. Whether this is the end of the Breweries'rationalisation' programme in the town is open to debate. The two other closed pubs stand empty awaiting buyers as private residences, Greene King would not sell as licensed premises in case of competition.

Two of the areas notable freehouses have changed hands. The Old Ferryboat Inn at Holywell has now been purchased by Marstons becoming a tied house selling their ales and the Crown, Eaton Socon has been sold to Scottish and Newcastle.

The Jolly, Abbot at Abbotsley has now re-opened as a Free house.

## BREWERY CLOSURES.....

# R U D D L E S DEMONSTRATION

Rutland Conservative MP has joined a demonstration against Morland's brutal axing of cult brery Ruddles of Langham.

THe MP helped bury a PET bottle filled with cask County to symbolise the death of one of Britain's best known breweries, saying "If it isn't brewed in Rutland, it can't be Ruddles". The demonstration attracted CAMRA members from all over the Country as well as local branches. Campaigners would continue to rally public opinion against the devastation of Rutland's heritage being wreaked by a company of incomers, especially as CAMRA helped Morlands escape a similar fate only five years earlier.

# MORRELLS, O P P O S I T I O N MOUNTS

CAMRA is planning a two-pronged assault on the asset strippers who want to sell Oxford's historic Morrell Brewery to property developers.

It was announced in July that the brewery and tied estate were up for sale.

At national level, the campaign is taking the fight to Morrells' trustees and shareholders, seeking to persuade them that a fire sale of a valuable long term proposition is in no-body's best interests.

And at local level, Oxford CAMRA

branch is to run a publicity campaign aimed at persuading city councillors not to grant change of use permission on the valuable St. Thomas Street site.

Local press and TV coverage has already been won as the fight gathers momentumThere is also a campaign to win statutory listing for as many of the brewery's 130 pubs as possible and oppose all future change of use applications.

### CASTLE EDEN, HOPES RISE

A consortium of North-East businessmen is hoping to rescue Castle Eden, Whitbreads brewery near Hartlepool which the national beer giant plans to close on October Ist with the beers being moved to the Boddingtons, Manchester plant.

The group has made a bid for the site and if successful would continue to brew there. The only stumbling block appears to be the value of the brands produced at Castle Eden.

Miles Templeman, MD of the Whitbread Beer Company confimed that he was pursuing the sale of the brewery as a going concern and added that the deadline could be extended.

Whitbread's Flowers Brewery in Cheltenham is also due to close on October 1st, with staff having been given their statutory redundancy notices.
