

THANKYOU ADNAMS

It was on November 5th that a dozen intrepidSt.Neots CAMRA Branch made the the two hour mini-bus trip to Southwold, Suffolk to tour Adnams wonderful brewery.

We knew that we were in for a marvellous day when as alightighting from our bus we were greeted by the sight of an Adnams dray pulled by two superb shire horses leaving the brewery, laden with ale for delivery to their local pubs.

We then were introduced to our tour guide - Denis- who had worked as an engineer for the company but, whose knowledge on Adnams was now being put to excellent use. As the tour progressed we were amazed at his talk, certainly the most interesting and in-depth I personally had ever heard on my numerous trips around the countries breweries.

He told us how Adnams had bought and built their brewing plant peacemeal from other breweries nationwide in the early seventies. Fermenting vessels from Threllfalls at a purchase price of £200, but with a transportation cost of £80,000 to bring them South and milling plant from Greenalls in 1976

Other equipment had been bought from Thwaites and our own Charles

Wells with the last two 'coppers' to be buit in the UK now sitting proudly in the Adnams Brewhouse. Six superb 100-barrell open fermenting vessels from the seventies, refurbished to be as good as knew, alongside 16 other FV's, the majority now made from stainless steel.

Denis told us how the business had grown into an annual turnover of £38m, brewing 500 barrells a day, using high gravity brewing techniques-beer brewed at a gravity of 1075 and then water added at about a 3:1 ratio to bring the beers down to mid gravity.

He told us how Dutch settlers in 1560 had introduced hops to England to increase longevity in the life of what then became 'beer'. Prior to this it was 'ale' that was brewed with a very short 'shelf-life'.

He then took us ouit of the brewhouse to show us some very unusual architecture, but you will have to go on the brewery trip yourself to see that particular sight, I won't spoil things by telling about it. The tour ended after about an hour and a half, but there was still lots more to come.

We were taken to the Red Lion, one of the local Adnams houses and treated to the best fish and chip meal I have ever had, with the largest piece of plaice one could possibly eat and, to wash it down some superb Adnams Bitter and Oyster Stout.

After this we made our own way to the back-room of the Crown, who were closing at three and just caught the last drink there.


After this it was a visit to the two 'open-all-day' Adnams pubs in the town.

First it was the Sole Bay on East Green, a stones throw from the brewery and then onto the packed Lord Nelson at 5.0pm for a prearranged meet-up with the Adnams Brewer.

A quick jog up to the Kings Head, now open for the evening completed my own personal crawl of the town but, some of the more (fool?) hardy members of our party had interspersed a walk along the very wet and blustery seafront with their drinking pursuits.

It was very pleasing to see all the epubs visited having a full range of the currently brewed Adnams ales on sale in what is a quiet time of the year for the two. We did bump into another party of Adnams lovers who had travelled down from Leicester for the day. So between us we probably helped the seasonal averages along very nicely. It was also nice to converse with some of the locals who are understandably very proud of what they have in town. Superb tour, superb food, superb beer, superb day. Once again, thanks Adnams and thanks driver for getting me home O.K.

BIG BREWERS HAMMERED IN 2000 GOOD BEER GUIDE

THE ALE TIDE IS BEGINNING TO TURN.

As the 2000 edition of the Good Beer Guide shows, more and more regional and smaller craft brewers are reporting increasing sales and profits for cask beer.

The likes of Belhaven, Brakspear, Fuller's, Moorhouses, Shepherd Neame, Timothy Taylor and Young's announce booming sales while Adnams is rebadging its cask beers as part of a five year plan to boost its brands.

Even the mighty Bass, which has largely abandoned cask beer for a decade, has inserted colour leaflets in the trade press for draught Bass and its reduced real ale portfolio.

Good Beer Guide editor Roger Protz said: "The 2000 Guide is probably our toughest for years: we hammer the national brewers for turning their backs on real ale.

"The so-called real ale crisis is the result of the nationals abandoning cask ale. The media has focused on the closures of Morrells, vaux and Ward's as proof that real ale is in decline, but those closures have nothing to do with beer sales and everything to do with companies being asset-stripped."

More than two dozen new breweries are listed in the 2000 Good Beer Guide, a sign, says Protz, that small brewers are optimistic about the future.

"But there's no room for complacency," he added. "Even if Bass does start to promote its cask beers again it will never win back the market share the likes of Draught Bass once enjoyed."

"Big brewers have fuelled real ale's decline by substituting keg variants

of brands like Tetley, John Smith's, Boddington, and Stone's for the cask versions."

"The big brewers are strangling beer choice in pursuit of bigger profits from processed lagers and keg beers."

"Bass and other nationals see cask beer as a minority style to be sold at premium prices in upmarket pubs. CAMRA has to make it the people's beer again and that's why we have to support regional and microbrewers who pin their faith on the style." Proof positive that consumers want to drink real ale comes in the shape of CAMRA's rising membership. Following hugely successful beer festivals in London, Olympia and Peterborough, membership is now close to 55,000.

Numbers have more than doubled in the past 10 years - a fact that suggests it is the national brewers not drinkers who are out of touch with the modern beer market.

The Merry Boys, Eynesbury, St. Neots is serving the seasonal Black Baron from Greene King as well as its usual IPA and Abbot.

The fast growing Cask Marque scheme has awarded Mel Pilson at **The Royal Oak, St. Ives** with a plaque. Other local pubs that have already received the award are The Bulls Head, St. Neots and The Cock at Gamlingay.

One of the veterans of the real-ale off licence scene is bowing out after 18 years. John Harling has put the Good Beer Guide listed **Jug & Firkin** in Mill Road, **Cambridge** up for sale saying he needs a change - and a break from working seven days a week.

In his time competition had intensified dramatically, with only a handful of specialist beer off-licences nationwide. Now, even though they couldn't match the 250 British and imported bottled beers sold at the Jug & Firkin, local supermarkets were carrying far wider ranges. The J & F has always been a big supporter of British micro-brewers' bottled beers, let's hope whoever takes it over continues in the same vein.
