POTTON BREWING REVIVAL

Local CAMRA members were entertained recently at one of our newest local brewers, Potton Brewery which came on stream a year ago at the hand of Clive Towner in partnership with Bob Hearson, former engineering manager at Mortlake and then Greene Kingís Biggleswade brewery until its closure.

In 1922 the original Potton Brewery existed in what became a co-op store ñ the brewery building is still there, but brewing ceased after takeover by Lark Street brewery of Bedford, themselves swallowed up by Wells and Winch at Biggleswade who eventually became part of Greene King. The story has now come full circle, with a Greene King brewer now brewing in Potton, and it would have been a perfect twist to the tale had the new brewery been located in the original brewery premises. This almost occurred, because the premises were offered, but planning permission was not forthcoming, surprising for what was after all once a brewery.

The new brewery can produce 10 barrels at a time although some brews are 5 barrels. A new 10-barrel fermenting vessel is to be added, giving a capacity of 30 barrels a week. The beers are named after local connections. Bob offered us samples of Shannon IPA, named after a locomotive that once plied the local railway, and Shambles, named after a part of Potton market. Shambles is a 4.3% alcohol malty bitter with a gentle hoppiness and some sweetness. Shannon IPA at 3.8 % is bitterer and a little less full-bodied. Hops used include Target, Cascade and First Gold varieties, plus Styrian Goldings in Shambles and Sticklebract hops from New Zealand.

Other beers include Phoenix, 4.8%, named after Potton brewery rising from the ashes and Pride of Potton at 6%. Dumb Blonde is a ginger and citrus flavoured summer ale. The origin of that name may or may not be shared by Village Bike at 4.3%. Bottled beers are also produced, including Butlers Ale, produced for the National Trust and sold at Wimpole Hall.

Most of the beer is delivered direct to outlets in an area bounded by Stamford, Hertford

and Cambridge to the west of Bedford. Shannon is the best selling beer, but Shambles is increasingly popular. More excellent beer was sampled in the Rose and Crown in Potton. We wish Bob and Clive all the best with their venture, and thank them for an interesting and hospitable evening.

Robin and Judith Doughty have been in 12 consecutive appearances of the Good Beer Guide since 1989. Robin's enthusiasm for well kept real ale is further shown by his preference for stocking distinctive locally brewed beers, including the rare dark mild Elgoods Black Dog.

Robin and Judith have extended and improved the pub over the years, adding accommodation, but the pub retains the feel of a traditional village pub and the pub plays a full role in the community life of the village.

Green Man, Leighton Bromswold



Dave and Toni Hanagan have been at the Green Man since 1990, and have been in every edition of the Good Beer Guide since 1991 including the current 2000 edition.

Dave is a true enthusiast regards beer and pubs. Not only does he stock a wide range of distinctive real ales, all from independents and micros, he also stocks ranges of Belgian and German beers, and English bottle conditioned beers. The decor of Green Man reflects Dave's passion for pub memorabilia with a vast assortment or mirrors, bottles and signs, and pub has been continually enhanced and improved over the years, usually by Dave's own hands. In his "spare" time, Dave is a keen skittles player and he regularly joins branch members on tasting trips to Belgium. The Green Man has been an East Anglian Pub of the Year and was the Cambridgeshire Pub of the Year in 1999.

OTHER NEWS

ADNAMS CHANGE BEER RANGE

Adnams of Southwold, well known in our area, have made some controversial changes to their beer range with the withdrawal of some favourites: EXTRA, DARK MILD. OYSTER STOUT and OLD ALE, evidently due to poor sales and with Adnams brewing at beyond its capacity of 66,000 barrels a year rationalisation took over. These have been replaced by a new cask beer TRINITY at 5.2% abv (alcohol by volume). Brewed from pale and wheat malts it will be launched early next year and is aimed at "the first time drinker" although it will have a distinctive flavour.

As 'compensation' for the lost beers, new seasonal FISHERMAN, a dark red 4.5abv will be launched in the Autumn
